Those who live in the Southern Gulf Islands are accustomed to the joys and challenges of rural island life. These islands are magnets for creative individuals who revel in the solitude and appreciate the intimacy of life in a small community. The Southern Gulf Islands Arts Council (SGIAC) focuses on fostering opportunities for engagement and connection for the arts in our region with the goal of nurturing a robust overall arts scene while meeting the needs of our individual island communities. In 2021 we continued to work fulfill our goals despite restrictions resulting from ongoing pandemic.

Remaining money from the Capital Regional District Arts Fund grant received in 2020 was deployed for the second annual Arts on the Islands Regional Exhibition in 2021. As in the previous year, it was an online exhibition accompanied by a printed exhibition catalogue. The project was spearheaded by a committee based on Mayne Island and you can read more about it in the Mayne Branch report (page 6). We would like to thank all 70 of the artists who participated, congratulate the award winners, and express appreciation to the jurors, volunteers and supporters of this year's exhibition.

The ongoing goal of Arts on the Islands is "to create an environment of inclusivity while providing a showcase for the region's talent". The online exhibition and accompanying catalogue provided a showcase for the region's artists and their work that was available to an unlimited audience who could view the art and glimpse the culture, natural beauty, and creativity that's abundant in the Southern Gulf Islands. Connections were nurtured between the creative communities on Galiano, Mayne, Pender and Saturna as well as among those communities' individual artists – a particularly valuable outcome during the ongoing isolation imposed by the pandemic. We were excited to have several emerging artists join the exhibition and be included alongside established professionals.

The Online Artists Directory, established in 2020 on the www.artsontheislands.org website, continued to grow, with more artists taking advantage of the ability to create a profile, complete with images and links, that's connected to an interactive map of the region. The directory is populated by artists from each of our island communities and provides residents and visitors with a valuable resource tool. We're pleased to be able to offer this benefit to members of the SGIAC as one of the perks of being part of this organization.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT CONT'D...

An exciting outcome of 2021 was the formation of a new branch of the Southern Gulf Islands Arts Council. Pamala Page of Saturna Island joined the SGIAC Board of Directors as a Supporting Director early in the year, and in September she and fellow Saturna artist Monica Morten spearheaded the formation of the new Saturna Branch. We look forward with great anticipation to seeing how the Branch develops and the arts initiatives generated from the Saturna arts community. We also welcome Pamala and Monica as directors representing the Saturna Branch at the SGIAC board table.

Behind the scenes we are working to establish a strong organization that operates under sound bylaws, policies and practices (not the most exciting aspect of the work but necessary nonetheless), and we continue to seek opportunities to nurture the vibrant arts scene in the Southern Gulf Islands.

BRANCH REPORTS

Under the Southern Gulf Islands Arts Council's organizational structure adopted in 2019, members from each island community have the opportunity to form a Branch. Each Branch has autonomy over its activities and finances while operating under the organizational umbrella (see diagram below) of the Southern Gulf Islands Arts Council and capitalizing on the advantages and strengths of being part of a regional non-profit society. The first Branch to form was on Mayne Island (2019) and with a second branch forming on Saturna Island (2021).






BRANCH REPORT MAYNE Submitted by Deforah Strong

As Year Two of the global pandemic overshadowed our lives, the Mayne Island Branch of the Southern Gulf Islands Arts Council (aka Arts on Mayne) continued to energize the arts on our little island. Arts program funding from the Mayne Island Parks and Recreation Commission was used to support a fall concert by Salt Spring Baroque, Mayne Island Little Theatre's radio play production of A Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy, and a music program for children in the Mayne School. In recognition of the gap in arts support for teenagers who are too young to be Arts on Mayne members but no longer attend Mayne's school, we launched the AXY Grant program (Art eXplorations for Youth) that supports self-directed arts activities for that age group.


The second Arts on the Island Regional Exhibition was again spearheaded by a Mayne-based committee consisting of myself, Mary L Griffin, Kenneth Newby and Carolyn Howse. As in the previous year, its focus was an online exhibition and printed exhibition catalogue. We welcomed 70 artists from Galiano, Mayne, Pender and Saturna working in 2-D, 3-D and multimedia, and also showcased a handful of performers via video link on the Southern Gulf Islands Arts Council website: (artsontheislands.org).



BRANCH REPORT

MAYNE

Twenty-eight Mayne Island artists participated in the exhibition and two of them, Mark Wells and Kim Korol, were among the award winners. Three jurors – Susan Falk, Liane Davison and Jason Gress – took on the challenging task of assessing the art. We were fortunate to receive prize donations in the form of gift cards for art supplies from Island Blue, and a significant printing discount from Metropol Printing. The remaining funds from the CRD Arts & Culture grant received in 2020 made the event possible.



On the Labour Day long weekend in September, Arts on Mayne brought together more than 50 of the island's artists for a three-day Fall Art Gala in the Agricultural Hall. After such a long period of isolation, the island's artists and art appreciators were eager to see one another as well as view the artwork on display. This was the main exhibition opportunity we were able to present given Art in the Library shows continued to be suspended throughout 2021.

For the second time, Arts on Mayne organized the island's Fall Art Studio Tour, November 12-14. Thirty-seven artists, artisans and crafters presented their work at 19 locations around the island, including home studios, shops, and the community centre. It was a successful event and spirits were not dampened by that weekend's "atmospheric river" that deluged the region with rain. Participant feedback indicated enthusiasm for a tour in the spring as well as in the fall. Throughout this second unprecedented pandemic year, Arts on Mayne was able to keep working to create exhibition opportunities, support arts activities and keep connections strong among the artists in our community.
